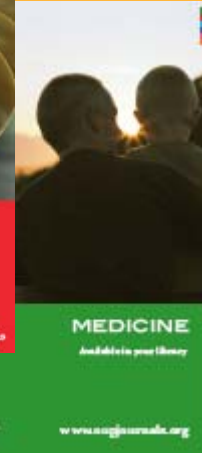

Why?

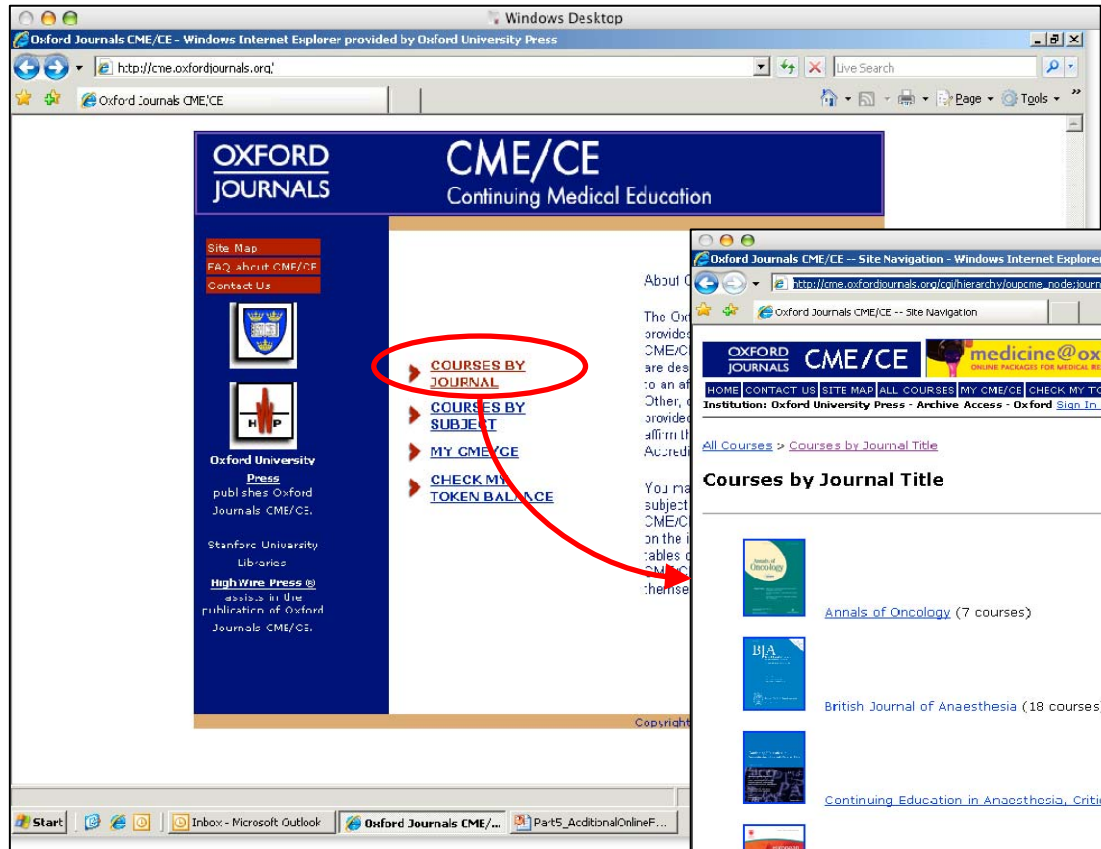
- Many medical practitioners are required to take part in continuing education in order to keep up-to-date with current research.

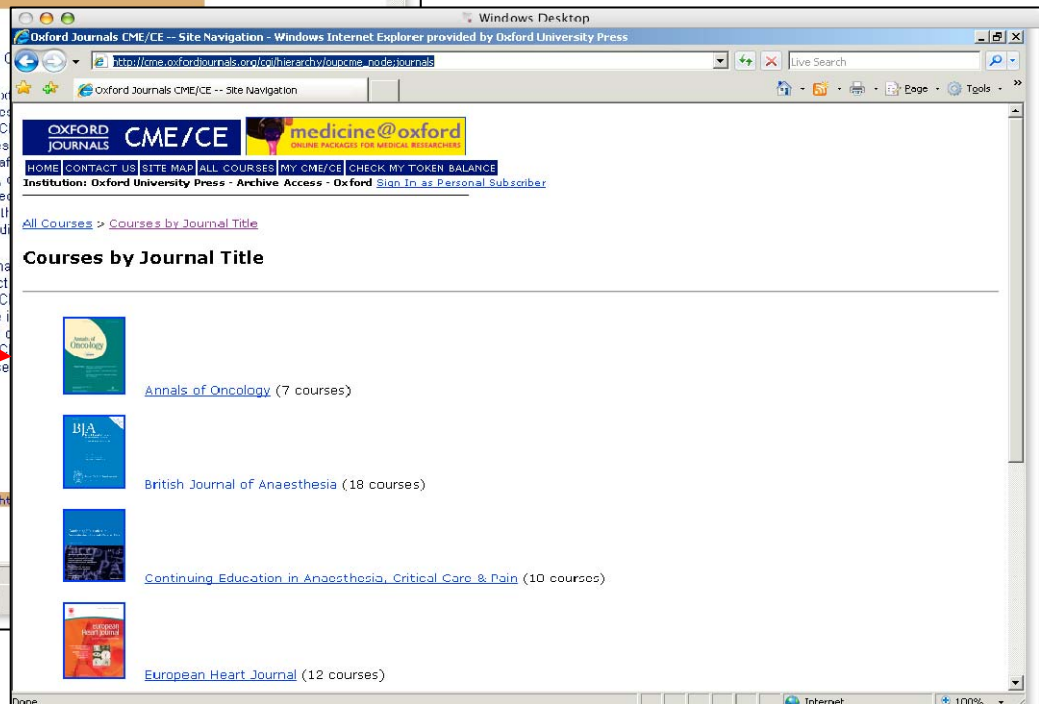
